Ha Lachma Onya. "This is the bread of affliction" we read in the Passover Haggadah in ancient Jewish Aramaic. It is the bread of affliction because it reminds us of Egyptian slavery as recounted in the Torah in Shemot, the Book of Exodus.

At the same time it is the bread of liberation, for unleavened bread is not what the Hebrew slaves normally ate. Despite their miserable lives of deprivation they were able usually to bake bread with yeast. But not on the day of freedom. On that day they hastily left with the unleavened bread. Ironically then the bread which was lacking the crucial ingredient - leaven - became the matzo, which defined the holiday.

*Chametz*, that is leaven, became central to the entire Passover festival; so much so in fact, that it became known as the Feast of Unleavened Bread - *Chag Ha Matzot. Pesach* is also known as the Feast of the Time of our Freedom - *Chag zeman Cheruteinu*. As a result, in Jewish theology, Matzo and Freedom are conjoined as concepts. In fact, in the *Ha Lachma Onya* prayer at the beginning of the Seder, we recite that "this year we are slaves, but next year we will be *B'nai chorin* - free people.

The eating of matzo is a mitzvah - a commandment - for *Pesach*. It is specifically commanded at the Seder/s. No food is more important in the Jewish tradition. Indeed, Jews spend the day before Passover cleaning the house of any leaven (*Bedikat*  *Chametz*) and then the next morning burning the leaven found (*Biur Chametz*).

The strictness with which the *Halacha* (rabbinic law) treats the need to be utterly pure of leaven is legendary. Different dishes for the *Chag* - Holy Festival - are required at the minimum. Many traditional Jews go much further than that.

Also these cracker like cakes made of unfermented flour and water became central to Christian theology and practice - particularly in the Orthodox and Roman Catholic traditions. In these traditions the Eucharist is performed with unleavened wafers. The Last Supper took place during the Passover week and so the bread was unleavened.

Matzo is also prominent in Jewish life during the Passover season. Not too many people like to eat matzo plain, or even with butter/margarine or jam/ jelly, and so matzo *Brei*, chocolate covered matzo, matzo brittle, matzo ball soup and many other ways have been discovered and invented over the centuries by creative cooks to allow we poor Jews to eat our matzo a little more happily.

May the children of God all be free in our own lifetimes.

#### SISTERHOOD BOWLS 'EM OVER!

Crafty members of TBI Sisterhood got a chance to help a worthy cause, "The Empty Bowl Project," by forming clay into usable bowls. Tammy Marinuzzi, Associate Professor of Visual Arts at Gulf Coast State College, invited the group to participate and many of us did. Tammy was kind enough to give us a few quick lessons before we began so our bowls wouldn't leak and might actually be used by someone.

The Empty Bowl Project has been around for more than 25 years and is a worldwide charitable endeavor. Artists, clubs, classes, etc. create their own "art community" to produce bowls that will later be sold to make money towards the goal of ending hunger. In our case, GCSC donated the clay and other materials needed to make bowls, Tammy and her crew donated their time and expertise, and the women of the Sisterhood got to be creative.

After firing and glazing, the bowls are filled with soup and sold for \$10 each. We'll have a chance to buy our bowls back on April 14 at GCSC. All of the proceeds go to a hunger-related local charity. Thanks to Tammy, GCSC and all the folks who participated and donated. It was great fun!

For the past couple of years, Nate Mewhinney and Harold Prows have been visiting the Calhoun County Correctional Center to give Jewish prisoners a chance to practice their religion. Recently, since Harold has been occupied with a full time job, Mike Starkman has volunteered to help Nate. The prison authorities and chaplain have welcomed the lay leaders and make time and space available to them.

On Friday nights, Nate leads a Shabbat service for the men including a discussion about the Torah reading for that week. Temple B'nai Israel was happy to donate unused siddurs for the men to use. An offer to borrow the small ark in storage at the shul went by the wayside for lack of space at the prison – but, perhaps that will change in the future.

In addition to Shabbat services, Nate and friends visit the inmates on two Tuesdays each month. These visits offer a more free form discussion where the men are encouraged to talk about anything they wish. The discussions sometimes get quite personal. This helps the men to feel more connected with the world. For many of the men, these visits are their only connection to the outside.

For Nate and his fellow lay-leaders, it's rewarding to help the men find some rays of hope and connect or reconnect spiritually. The men are always happy to see Nate (and crew) and glad to participate. We, at TBI, are proud of our volunteer lay leaders and want to support their work in any way we can. They are performing a mitzvah for which we are all grateful.
