The Sisterhood's second Interfaith Jewish-Muslim Women's Breakfast on Saturday, November 5th was another joyous gathering. Our goal was to decide on our first outreach project for the greater Bay County community. After discussing several options, we agreed to join forces on a project the Muslim members had undertaken the previous year – providing groceries for students at the Deane Bozeman School from food-insecure households for the 9-day Thanksgiving school break. Over the next 10 days we collected supplies.

In lieu of our regular Sisterhood meeting on Wednesday evening, November 16th we met at the Bay County Islamic Society's Mosque on Token Road to fill 100 reusable Publix bags marked "Food for Sharing." Many hands made light work, new friendships were formed, laughs were shared, and the local media did a great job of covering it. 

When most people think of Chanukah, they think of a holiday around the same time as Christmas, the miracles of the oil lasting for eight days and the Jews defeating a stronger army, and exchanging presents with our friends and family. But Chanukah isn't just a holiday celebrated in North America. There are fascinating ways Jews all over the world celebrate this winter holiday. Test your knowledge of Chanukah celebrations around the world with some trivia, and try out some of these traditions this year!

- 1. In what country do Jews replace latkes with a food called "burfi," a confectionary made with condensed milk and sugar?
- 2. After the Shabbat that falls during Chanukah each year, Jews in Avignon, a city in the south of what country go from home to home, sample the cooking of their neighbors, and toast the holiday together?
- 3. In what country do Jews sing a song commemorating the eight Chanukah candles called "Ocho Candelas," and eat oil-fried fritters known as "burmelos?"
- 4. What type of oil do Indians of Jewish heritage use to light their chanukiot?
- 5. In what country do Jews share recipes for a lightly sweetened, olive oil infused, honey-covered treat called "precipizi?"

- 6. In what city in Israel are there spaces cut into the sides of buildings so people can display their chanukiot outside?
- 7. In Santa Marta, Colombia, instead of eating fried potato latkes, they eat "patacones," or fried what?
- 8. In what country were double-decker chanukiot with space for 16 lights common?
