Temple B'nai Israel hosted the Interfaith Harmony Council's quarterly pot luck for the first time on Saturday, January 20<sup>th</sup>. **Celebrating Purim** by Rabbi Alana Wasserman


This month, we will celebrate the holiday of Purim. Jewish people around

the world will read from the book of Esther, a story that was meant to be a farce. The silliness of the story is exacerbated by the costumes we wear and the noise we make upon hearing our enemy's name. We eat delicious Hamentaschen, cookies shaped like triangles, to remind us of Haman's ridiculous 3-cornered hat/his pointy ears (in Israel, these cookies are called Oznei Haman, which means "Haman's ears"). However, in the midst of all this mishigas (Yiddish for "craziness"), there is a very serious message in the story of Purim.

Anti-semitism is no laughing matter. The Jewish people have been persecuted throughout history. And yet, we persevere. We persevere because we have Esthers and Mordechais in our midst. Brave, courageous people who are willing to speak up and speak out against hatred and oppression. The story of Purim reminds us that we were once oppressed. It reminds us that anti-semitism still exists today. However, it also reminds us that each of us has the potential to be like Esther and Mordechai and stand up and speak out when we experience prejudice, and when we see it happening to others.

This year, as we shake our graggers to drown out Haman's name, let us think of more ways that we can be like Esther and Mordechai to drown out hate in our own day. I look forward to celebrating Purim with all of you on my next visit!

### Jewish American Heritage Week is February 12 - 16

The Florida Legislature has designated the week of February 12 – 16 as *Jewish American Heritage Week in Florida*. Both the Florida Senate and Florida House of Representatives passed identical bills last month. According to the Florida Legislature:

- Nationally, Jewish American Heritage Month resulted from a congressional initiative launched in 2005 to recognize the more than 360-year history of Jewish contributions to North American culture
- The population of Jewish Americans in the United States has grown to 5.7 million, of which 654,860 Jewish Americans reside in Florida
- Jewish Americans have made vital contributions to the development of our communities, academic institutions, civic organizations, and businesses
- While contributing to every facet of American society, Jewish Americans have infused our nation's civic, social, economic, and cultural life with their own unique culture, customs, and dynamic heritage
- Jewish Americans have worked to promote civil rights and build bridges of mutual understanding between the world's religions

# Survey request received from Arlee Boyett, 4th-year student at New College of Florida

My name is Arlee Boyett and I'm a fourth-year student at New College of Florida. In order for me to obtain my bachelor's degree focusing on psychology with an honors denotation, I am completing a thesis project which includes a psychological study. My topic focuses on experiences of antisemitism, Jewish ethnic identity, and conversion. I am contacting you to request that you forward this email which includes a link to the survey to your congregation email list so that I have enough participants for my study and that I am able to learn about a diversity of individual experiences. This research is important because there is little research on the topic, particularly the aspect of conversion, and the results could aid in outreach and counseling to Jewish populations, whether they be Jews-by-birth or Jews-by-choice. Once my results are compiled and analyzed in the spring, I would be happy to send your congregation the aggregated results so that you may have access to any information acquired. Results are fully anonymous and the shared results will be aggregated across multiple congregations.
