The Jewish New Year for the Trees is *Tu B'Shevat* and this year it begins at sunset on January 30<sup>th</sup>. The holiday has undergone an evolution from its original purpose – recognizing agricultural progress – to an opportunity to practice environmental stewardship today.

Agriculture was of the utmost importance during the era of the first and second temples in Jerusalem. Farmers planted crops and orchards, fig trees and nuts. Back then the first four years of the trees' growth were

meant to be maturation years for the plants. But after the fourth year and on *Tu B'Shevat*, farmers could reap the benefits of their plantings. Farmers were also asked to tithe one tenth of their produce as a tax to the government.

When we were kids, most of us remember being asked to fund the planting of trees in Israel. And, if you've ever been to Israel, you can see the multitude of trees that have helped to "green" the Holy Land. In addition, modern observance of Tu B'Shevat includes having a Seder similar to a Passover Seder but one showcasing grains, nuts and fruit as the centerpiece of the meal.

Today's Jews also observe Tu B'Shevat by joining in activities that help our environment – recycling drives, plantings, taking advantage of educational opportunities about ecology and saving our planet, and so on. It can be a good holiday to plan and participate in earth-centered projects as a family.

#### Hi everyone!

I hope you are getting used to the sound of 2018! As you know this month, your community is hosting the Interfaith Harmony Council's quarterly Pot Luck Dinner. If you are having trouble coming up with ideas for perfect dish to bring, then you have come to the right article! <u>My Jewish Learning</u> offers a variety of delicious traditional and non-traditional Jewish recipes that would be perfect for the occasion. In light of having an interfaith potluck dinner, I thought it would be interesting to share with you a small taste of the different cultures within our faith.

The Sephardic cuisine, for instance, has an elaborate history that is rooted in Islamic world. Before the Spanish Inquisition, Jews flourished in the Islamic society and they certainly left their mark. Today, we joke that matzah ball soup is our homemade version of penicillin, but what if I told you that Jewish food truly did have the power to heal people? According to an article from My Jewish Learning, "Cookbooks that cataloged medical advice alongside recipes were a common genre of literature in the Muslim world. The 13th-century Cookbook of the Maghreb and Andalusia, one of the most important of these books, lists five Jewish recipes." After their expulsion from Spain, their recipes still managed to bring a lot to the table. In fact, to this day Morocco considers the Sephardic cuisine as one of their four "national food styles."

If you are interested in cooking up a unique dish for the potluck that offers a blend of rich spices and flavor, you may feel inspired by the following recipes:

- <u>Stuffed Grape Leaves with</u> <u>a twist</u>
- <u>Sephardic Jeweled Rice</u>

The Jewish food of Yemen has quite the story to tell because the flavor is a direct result of intermarriage between the Jewish men of India and Yemenite women. Here are a few eye-popping recipes that would serve as a unique symbolic dish.

- Vegetarian Yemenite Soup
- Yemenite Kubaneh Bread with Grated Tomato Dip
- Hawajj Hot Cocoa with Cinnamon Whipped Cream

I hope these dishes will inspire you to explore the different cultures within Judaism.
