Bikur cholim, visiting the sick, is an important mitzvah. In our weekday morning blessing, Eilu d'varim, we say, "These are the precepts whose fruits a person enjoys in This World but whose principal remains intact for him in the World to Come." One of these precepts is visiting the sick. The rabbis teach us in a midrash that God models this behavior for us. After Abraham is circumcised, God goes to visit him to make him feel better.

Message from President Mike Starkman

This being my first message as your president, I would like to thank the previous board and officers for all of their efforts in the past two years. For those that did not attend the Annual Congregational Meeting last month, it was announced that we have extended Rabbi Wasserman's contract for another year, which will include a monthly visit. She will be presiding over most of the major religious holidays, including Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Chanukah. Our Rabbi will also lead our Passover Seder this year. Obviously there is more information to follow.

Also, this year we ask that you be as generous as possible, within your means, and to pledge more than the basic amount. All of the committees of our congregation need your support and help. Together we can resolve our issues.



Friday, August 18th and Friday, December 15th



The Six Day War by Rabbi Richard Baroff

It was 50 years ago last month that Israel fought and won a decisive war against several Arab states. These states were led by the Egyptian president Gamal Abdel Nasser, Israel's greatest enemy of that era.

Nasser used the common hatred of Israel as part of the foundation for his doctrine of Pan-Arabism, the idea that Arab solidarity should cross the lines of national states.

Here was a project that Syria, Iraq, Jordan and Egypt could agree on: the destruction of the state of Israel. This would make Nasser the hero of the Arab world, even more than the Suez Crises of 1956 had done.

It was thought that the Arab armies attacking the Jewish State might succeed where they had failed in 1948. As the Egyptian armies massed in the Sinai, and as Egypt blocked Israel's southern port, the Israeli Air Force struck on June 5, 1967.

Very quickly the Egyptian and other Arabair forces were destroyed. Their armies fell within a week in the Sinai

and Golan Heights. Also the Israeli army had reunited Jerusalem for the first time under Jewish control since ancient times. Israeli soldiers prayed at the Wall in the Old City.

The ancient biblical lands of Judea and Samaria on the Jordan River's West Bank were captured as well.

The relief among Jews throughout the world was intense. Israel was not at the time thought of as a military power.

No one expected Israel to quickly and completely defeat its enemies. The Holocaust had happened only two decades before. Many Jews were fearful of a second Holocaust. Nasser was thought of as a Near Eastern version of Hitler. The much harder victory of the War of Independence in 1948-49 had felt like a miracle, the Six Day War even more so.

Israeli leaders became household names in America, like Foreign Minister Abba Eban, Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, and Chief of Staff Yitzhak Rabin.

The war left a much more complex Middle East. Israeli control over the Sinai, Gaza, Golan Heights and West Bank have been challenging diplomatically. In particular, hundreds of thousands of West Bank Arabs, called Palestinians, came under Israeli control. The Sinai was returned in stages to Egypt by 1982. The Israelis left Gaza in 2004. Terrorists took over there.

This week we remember the great Israeli victory which changed everything. It ensured the survival of the Jewish state, destroyed Nasser and Pan-Arabism, and left the Israeli government many headaches.

In spite of these headaches, we thank God for this victory, for the reunification of Jerusalem, and for the opportunity to search for peace through a position of strength.
