Not Yet a Member of B'nai Israel?

Over the years, when traveling, if time allowed, I would try to understand the local history of a city and would often search out the synagogues in a community. When inquiring further I recall at times hearing "this is where the synagogue used to be. The building is now used by (always some other group)." Okay, I get it. Sometimes it is economic and sociological trends that result in Jews leaving communities and living elsewhere. But at other times it is a result of Jews remaining in their community and failing to engage with their synagogue(s).

We only have one Reform synagogue here in Bay County. Many members of Temple B'nai Israel travel well over one hour each way to participate in services. This is not New York, Chicago, or Miami where there remain sizeable Jewish communities. The relatively small number of Jewish households across Bay County and its adjacent counties is quite small. Maintaining an active, vibrant synagogue is not an easy task. Yet, by reading this piece you have some common interest in preserving B'nai Israel's presence across the Florida Panhandle.

Not yet a Member of B'nai Israel? There's an easy fix.

Take note, that while many synagogues have family membership dues well over \$1200 per year; the B'nai Israel board of directors has worked hard to hold family membership unchanged at the same \$880 for many years now. Financial hardship? No one will be turned away due to financial reasons. So please, whatever your past reason for not joining, why not begin the New Year as a member? Please understand that we want and need your participation and that you will be helping to ensure that we have a synagogue for future years.



The Family Service Agency is the Sisterhood's chosen tzedakah project. They help many of the most needy members of our community and are in desperate need of assistance in restocking their food pantry (see list below). Would you please consider bringing a donation to the synagogue this month? A Sisterhood member will deliver it to the Family Service Agency.

FOOD PANTRY: Our shelves are nearly bare and we are in dire need to be able to make more food boxes for individuals and families in crisis that have a home and the ability to cook. Specific needs are canned pork & beans, baked beans, mixed vegetables/veg-all, greens (all types), sweet peas, sloppy joe mix, hash, chili, stew, chicken & dumplings, fruit (150z), tomatoes (150z), and tomato sauce/paste. Additional items needed are: coffee (instant, ground, plastic jars if possible), juice (46oz), juice boxes, and gravy mix packets.


Judaica shop: Ready For the High Holidays?

A Superman of Action by Stephen Sickerman



You probably already know that Superman, America's first costumed superhero, was created by writer Jerome "Jerry" Siegel and artist Joseph "Joe" Shuster, two Jewish high school students living in Cleveland, Ohio. They sold Superman to National Comics (the future DC Comics) in 1938. The rest, as they say, is history. A couple of years ago a near-perfect copy of Action Comics #1, in which Superman first appeared, sold for over \$3 million! Not a bad return on a purchase made for one thin dime during the Great Depression. Look it up on the Internet if you don't believe me.

Aside from a multitude of comic book series, there have been Superman newspaper strips, radios and TV shows and, of course, numerous movies over the years. He may be fictional, but he's definitely an American icon.

Superman is commonly referred to by such epithets as the Man of Steel, the Man of Tomorrow, and the Last Son of Krypton. He's also been called the Big Blue Boy Scout because of his stolid demeanor and unflagging desire for truth and justice and yes, frankly, because he wears blue underwear. How strange that an alien from a distant world – a stranger in a strange land you might say – so firmly embraced core American values such as patriotism and fair play!

Those core American values have been called into question in recent months.

Perhaps that's why earlier this year, "DC Comics digitally restored a widely-circulated 1950s-era color poster of Superman advising school kids on the importance of respecting diversity. The author of the poster remains mysterious but the publisher reports that the revamped art is believed to be created by Superman artist Wayne Boring." The poster appears on the following page.

"In 1949, DC produced this same image and text in a limited run originally for a 12" x 18" brown paper schoolbook cover which was distributed to schools by the Institute for American Democracy, an offshoot of the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). This was the same the year that DC worked with the National Social Welfare Assembly to publish a long-running series of public service messages using its characters in the pages of its comic books. It was part of DC's corporate social responsibility, which would undoubtedly resonate in these modern times once again."
